A Nordic-French Research Day in the series *The Changing Arctic*

Today's understanding of the Arctic goes far beyond a focus on natural environments – not the least as it has broadened to include long populated areas of Greenland, Northern Norway, Sweden and Finland. The local communities also have an artistic, cultural and linguistic heritage which is often unknown outside of the Arctic region. The changes taking place in these societies, however, have a major impact on this heritage. Whether it be language transfer, the impact of tourism on artistic production, customs or traditional arts and crafts, local communities must re-examine their heritage in a globalized Arctic.

Due to its exceptional location, small population and unique linguistic space, Greenland is the perfect setting for discussions on changes in its inhabitants' traditional heritage. The educational aspect is also important and will supplement the ongoing productive discussions between France and Greenland on this issue.

Together with the University of Greenland (Ilisimatusarfik), the French Embassy / Institut français of Denmark invites you to a conference, followed by an open panel discussion in Nuuk.
